The Time of the Seagulls

A mysterious enemy with many faces. A magnetic Euskandinvaian thriller. A vertiginous beginning. A well-crafted plot that evokes landscapes, characters, intrigue, and emotion with great narrative skill.

As it does every September, Hondarribia is celebrating the feast of its patron saint with a parade commemorating the people's resistance to the French siege in 1638. Recently, the spectacle has been complicated by confrontations between those who defend the right of women to dress as soldiers and those who are opposed to including them in this tradition.

Ane Cestero is the coordinator for the security team for the event. The Dance of the Tulips

The new Basque master of suspense reveals his exceptional narrative skills, bringing together atmosphere, police science, and emotional issues with precision and pushing them inexorably toward a perfect ending.

A murderer with dark motivations and a disturbing signature: blood red tulips that appear by the corpses of women who have no obvious relationship to each other. All the crimes are different, except for their horrifying staging and the uncanny presence of fresh tulips in a season when they don't bloom.

Natalia, renowned radio host in Guernica, is run over by the train covering Urdaibai line. The driver is her husband; the police inspector, her lover. The victim was tied to the rails holding a delicate tulip in her hands.
